# **ABOUT HOBART AND WILLIAM SMITH**

Hobart and William Smith Colleges are private, coordinate, liberal-arts colleges in Geneva, N.Y. Hobart College was founded in 1822, William Smith College in 1908. Hobart enrolls 831 men and William Smith 1,035 women. The full-time equivalent teaching faculty numbers 156 members, 98 percent of whom hold doctoral degrees.

The two colleges have the same faculty; men and women students attend classes together and use the same library and laboratories. Each college, however, awards its own degrees, has its own dean and admissions office, and maintains its own student government and athletics programs.

#### ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

At the Colleges, the academic year is divided into two 15-week semesters. Students take four courses each term, eight per year, for either a bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degree. The academic program traditionally comprises four years.

Majors are available in American studies, anthropology, art, biology, biochemistry, chemistry, classics, comparative literature, computer science, economics, English, geoscience, Greek, history, Latin, mathematics, modern languages (French and Spanish), music, philosophy, physics, political science, psychology, religious studies, and sociology.

Individual majors may be developed in Asian studies, Africana/Latino studies, urban studies, and women's studies, among others. In addition, the Colleges offer a master's degree in education.

#### MISSION STATEMENT

The Hobart College Department of Athletics believes that intercollegiate athletics play a major role in the educational process, and strives to provide a challenging, meaningful, and exciting experience for student-athletes. The Department accomplishes this mission by serving as teachers, counselors, leaders, and representatives of the College and by offering quality instruction, services, and athletics facilities while promoting a high level of sportsmanship and competition.

#### ATHLETICS PROGRAM

The Hobart Statesmen, whose colors are royal purple and orange, field intercollegiate teams in 11 sports, including basketball, crew, cross country, golf, football, ice hockey, lacrosse, sailing, soccer, squash, and tennis, .

Hobart is a member of the Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association (UCAA), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and Divisions III and I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).



## SHAWN GRIFFIN Head Coach

Just the fifth man to guide the Hobart soccer program, Shawn Griffin has directed a steady progress that saw the Statesmen improve from 2000's 6-11-2 mark to last season's 10-8-2 record and an appearance in the inaugural UCAA Championship Tournament.

Prior to joining the Statesmen, he served 12 seasons on the soccer staff at Plymouth State College in New Hampshire, including eight seasons as head coach.

An outstanding motivator and recruiter, Griffin has mentored nine All-UCAA selections, including six on the 2002

teams, two NSCAA All-Northeast honorees, and a Verizon Academic All-District selection.

Griffin holds a national advanced coaching diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and was selected as the NSCAA's New England Region Coach of the Year in 1998. During his tenure at Plymouth State, Griffin was named the Little East Conference Coach of the Year five times.

A 1988 graduate of Plymouth State, Griffin played on three NCAA Tournament teams, helping the Panthers amass a 52-14-16 (.732) record. As head coach, he led Plymouth State to the NCAA Division III Tournament in 1995, 1997, and 1998, and to the ECAC Tournament in 1993, 1994, and 1999.

Overall, Griffin has compiled a career record of 115-73-16 (.603) in 11 years as a head coach.

Griffin lives in Geneva with his wife, Carol, an elementary school teacher, and their three children, Olivia, Connor, and Emily.



## DAN GILBERTSON Assistant Coach

Dan Gilbertson enters his fourth season with the Statesmen. A graduate assistant coach at Plymouth State College in 1999, he followed Head Coach Shawn Griffin to Hobart in 2000.

Gilbertson graduated from Plymouth State in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter and a three-year captain for the Panthers, playing sweeper as well as center midfielder. Gilbertson led the national powerhouse to three NCAA Tournaments and an undefeated regular season in 1998. He was a Regional All-American and a

three-time All-Little East Conference honoree. After graduation, Gilbertson played one season for the Vermont Voltage of the USL's Premier Development League.

Gilbertson holds a United European Football Association Junior Management certificate as well as a UEFA Preliminary certificate. He earned his national coaching diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America during the summer of 2003.

Gilbertson, a native of London, has been in the United States since 1995.

Featuring 12 first-year players and seven sophomores in 2002 the Hobart College soccer team played its way to a 10-8-2 record and a berth in the inaugural Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association

Tournament

The Statesmen posted a 4-3-0 record in a competitive UCAA, earning the fourth seed in the conference tournament before falling to eventual NCAA Semifinalist St. Lawrence. Hobart hit its stride in the home opener with a 1-0 win over Ithaca and won six of its next eight games.

Sophomore Ricky Klotz lead the Hobart attack with 10 goals and one assist, while fellow classmate Dan Abroms contributed six goals and four assists on the year. Rookie midfielder Micke Subotowicz added 13 points on three goals and a UCAA-best seven assists.

The Hobart defense was anchored by senior captain Bryan Bome and senior goalkeeper Cory Rosier. A



Junior defender Ramez Ghaly will be an important part of the Statesmen defense this year after earning a starting role in 2002.

2002 first-team All-UCAA selection, Rosier posted his best season in 2002, grabbing 10 wins and earning two shutouts. Bome started in all 19 games, providing good leadership at the center back position. Sophomores Christian Buestad not only provided quality play in the defensive end of the field, but also got into the attack, notching a goal and two assists.

After posting their first winning season since 1999, the Statesmen enter 2003 with eight starters and 18 players coming back from the previous year. Add to that a strong incoming corps and Hobart has the key ingredients for an outstanding season.

Klotz and sophomore John Rosenbaum could head the attack for the Statesmen this season. An All-Region selection in 2002, Klotz's strength and size will give opposing defenses problems both in the air and on the ground. His willingness to take players on in the offensive third of the field will open up scoring opportunities for his teammates. Rosenbaum also will be dangerous in the box, while his quickness and work rate will force defenders into mistakes.

Sophomores Ben Polk and Valentin Meloty-Kapella will see quality time at the striker position as well. Proven goal scorers, both players possess strong technical skills and

have the potential to be impact players for Hobart.

Eight players return to the midfield, including two All-UCAA selections. Junior Juan Vargas and sophomore Jamie Smith will run the flanks. Hobart's most technically gifted player, Vargas will create scoring opportunities from the outside midfield spot. Missing a few games last season due to injury, he is looking to return to his form as the rookie award winner in 2001. An extremely fit player, Smith possesses the endurance and ability to run at defenders for 90 minutes. His one-on-one skills have improved since last season making him a very dangerous part of the Hobart attack.

Sophomores Eduardo Ponce de Leon and Matt Vesonder will see quality minutes as well. Their strong technical game and creativity will make them solid contributors. Firstyear Ben Crosky also could have an immediate impact in the Statesmen's midfield.

The center of the field will be anchored by captains Abroms and Subotowicz. A second-team All-UCAA honoree, Abroms will be looked upon to distribute the ball and

provide scoring. An All-Region selection, Subotowicz's field vision and ability to possess the ball will make the Statesmen's midfield the most dangerous third of the field.

In the back, junior captain Christian Buestad and first-year Farid Hafsia will anchor the backline. A hard-nosed marking back, Buestad is extremely fit and has improved his game in the air. An exceptionally hard-working player, Hafsia possesses great vision and technical skills that will make an immediate impact on the Statesmen defense. Juniors Alex Coates, Ramez Ghaly, and Ross Offinger also will vie for regular starting roles in the back.

A physical presence in the back, Coates has the ability to strike a long ball, while Ghaly and Offinger both have a strong understanding of the game.

In the goal, sophomore

Chris Maravalli and first-year Carl


Sophomore captain Micke Subotowicz will anchor the midfield for the Statesmen in 2003. He earned All-Region honors last season after leading the conference in assists.

# Christian Buestad

Back, 6-1, 170, Orinda, Calif., Northfield-Mt. Hermon

A tri-captain, Buestad will anchor the Hobart defense this season. A solid defender on the flank, he improved his aerial game in the offseason. The two-year starter scored one goal and assisted on two others in 2002.



# Alex Coates

Back, 6-0, 175, Belvedere, Calif., Avon Old Farms

Coates provides a physical presence at center back for the Statesmen. Starting in 15 games last season, he netted one goal, and will be a key component to the backline this season. His ability to serve the long ball will add another threat to the Hobart offense



# Ramez Ghaly

Back, 5-7, 150, Syracuse, N.Y., Christian Brothers Acad.

A smart player who reads the game well, Ghaly will vie for a starting role on the backline for the Statesmen. A starter in 14 games last season, the Syracuse native had two assists.



Ricky Klotz Forward, 6-1, 180, Cortland, N.Y., Homer H.S.

A third-team All-Region selection in 2002, Klotz led the UCAA with 10 goals last season. Possessing a solid aerial game, he gives opposing defenders fits in front of the goal. Also strong on the ball, he's not afraid to take on defenders in the offensive third of the field to create more scoring opportunities.



# **COZZENS MEMORIAL FIELD**



Officially dedicated on Oct. 20, 2001, John H. Cozzens Jr. '41 Memorial Field is a full length – 75 yards by 120 yards – natural grass field and home to the Hobart and William Smith soccer teams. Cozzens Memorial Field was built during the summer of 2001 through a thoughtful bequest from John H. Cozzens Jr.

The field honors the life of John H. Cozzens Jr., a 1941 graduate of Hobart College. Cozzens played football, basketball, and lacrosse during his academic career. He lettered in football in 1939 and 1940, serving as team captain during his senior year.

# RFK VARSITY STRENGTH TRAINING CENTER

Named for three dedicated Statesmen, Dr. Robert Raleigh '73, Jeremy N. Foley '74, and James M. Kraus '74, the RFK Varsity Strength Training Center provides Hobart and William Smith's student-athletes with exclusive access to state-of-the-art strength training equipment. The facility was dedicated on April 12, 2002, and officially opened in August of 2002.

## **ADMINISTRATION**



## **President Mark Gearan**

Mark D. Gearan is a college president whose life exemplifies the strongest attributes of Hobart and William Smith Colleges: civic engagement, global awareness, a focus on the 21st century, and a commitment to students.

When named president in 1999, Gearan was serving as director of the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C., a post he assumed in 1995. Prior to his Peace Corps directorship, President Gearan served at the White House as Assistant to the President and Director of Communications, as well as Deputy Chief of Staff.

A native of Gardner, Mass., President Gearan earned his B.A. in government cum laude at Harvard University and his law degree from Georgetown University. He is also the recipient of 12 honorary degrees. His writings have been published extensively, including pieces in the *Boston Globe*, the *Miami Herald*, and the *San Francisco Examiner*. This past year several national media outlets called upon him for expertise on U.S. presidential transitions.



## **Dean of Hobart College Clarence Butler**

Clarence Butler became dean of Hobart College in July, 1998. Butler came to Hobart in 1979, after serving on the faculties at Brown University and Dartmouth College. He served as assistant dean, then was named senior associate dean in 1983 after serving for two years as acting dean of the College.

Butler has served on many committees, including the Committee on Standards, Individual Major Committee, and President's Advisory Council. Aside from his administrative duties, Butler has taught German part-time and, as an ordained minister, has at times served the local

community in that capacity as well.

Butler received bachelor's and doctoral degrees from Washington University in St. Louis, a master's from the University of Kansas, and the B.D. from the Episcopal Theological School. He also received a language diploma from the University of Stockholm in Sweden. He is a former Fulbright Scholar and DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service) Scholar.



## **Hobart Director of Athletics Mike Hanna '68**

A 1968 graduate of Hobart, Mike Hanna became the College's athletics director in 1981. He has piloted the athletics program through unprecedented championships in lacrosse, and his vision, along with that of his William Smith counterpart, has led to the construction of the Robert A. Bristol '31 Field House in 1989 and the Dr. Frank P. Smith '36 Squash Center in 1998. Improvements in the new millennium include an McCooey Field, Cozzens Memorial Field, the RFK Strength Training Center, the Topichak Team Rooms in the Elliott Varsity House, and the Tom Poole Team Room for Hobart Soccer.

As a quarterback, Hanna broke all of Hobart's season and career passing records during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. A second-team All-American lacrosse attackman in 1968, Hanna finished second for the Statesmen in scoring that year with 35 goals and 35 assists. He co-captained both the football and lacrosse teams his senior year. During his senior year he was awarded the Francis L. "Babe" Kraus Award as Hobart's Athlete of the Year and also was presented the Judge Kane Award as MVP in lacrosse.


