HEAD COACH CAROL WEYMULLER

Carol Weymuller enters her ninth season as the head coach of the Hobart squash program. Under her direction the Statesmen have been ranked in the top-20 nationally in each of the past eight seasons. She has a career record of 79-81.

Last season, Weymuller led the Statesmen to a 10-7 mark and a 12th place finish at the NISRA Team Championships. That is Hobart's highest ranking since earning the No. 13 spot in each of Weymuller's first two seasons.

In 1994, Weymuller and her husband, Fred, received the U.S. Squash Racquets Association President's Cup,

the most prestigious award presented by the USSRA.

Also the leader of the Hobart tennis program, Weymuller has led the Statesmen to a 74-85 overall record. The U.S. Professional Tennis Association recently honored

Wevmuller earned a bachelor's degree in Spanish and elementary education from

Weymuller earned a bachelor's degree in Spanish and elementary education from Bethany College in 1970. Upon graduation, she worked as a tennis and squash professional at the Heights Casino in Brooklyn, N.Y., from 1970 to 1980, followed by a stint at the Genesee Valley Club in Rochester, N.Y., from 1980 to 1993. From 1993 to 1995, she was the squash professional at the University of Rochester Medical Center Athletic Club and the tennis professional at the Country Club of Rochester.

An accomplished player as well, Weymuller was the No. 1 ranked player in New York City from 1976 to 1978. She served as captain of the U.S. Team in 1981 and 1983. She won a record 11 consecutive Rochester Women's Championships from 1981to 1991.

2003-04 Season Outlook

s the Hobart squash team prepares for its 38th season, the Statesmen have high hopes and the momentum of last season's 10-7 campaign that saw Hobart climb as high as 12th in the polls. The Statesmen return six of their top nine from a year ago, led by co-captains senior **RICHARD REUTTER** and junior **TEIVIR RATHORE**.

Hobart's No. 1 player over the past two seasons, Rathore posted a 10-7 record last season, while Reutter has been a solid contributor over the past three years, turning in a 9-8 mark in 2002-03.

The Statesman also welcome back several starters: juniors **HENRY CLUTSAM**, **FREDDY COOK**, and **ANDREW SCOTT** and sophomore **GAVIN JOHNSTONE-BUTCHER**. Clutsam enjoyed a breakthrough season as a sophomore, posting a stellar 13-4 mark, while Johnstone-Butcher was the cream of the rookie crop, recording an 11-6 mark, primarily at No. 2.

Hobart also welcomes the Class of 2007 to campus, the deepest and most talented group of rookies to venture to Geneva. First-years ANDY CONRAD (Haverford, Pa.), TUCKER CROCKETT (Rosemont, Pa.), BEN CROSKY (Williamstown, Mass.), JOHN KEATING (Linwood, N.J.), MATT LIBASSI



A two-sport athlete, Gavin Johnstone-Butcher posted an 11-6 six record in squash and, with the crew team, won a gold medal in the freshmen four at the IRA Regatta.

(Sharon, Conn.), **ANDREW MCDONOUGH** (Summit, N.J.), **PRATEEK PATNI** (Indore, M.P., India), **BRIAN SHIVER** (Morristown, N.J.), and **STEPHEN THAYER** (Manchester, N.H.) are all expected to push for a spot in the starting nine.

Co-captain Tejvir Rathore returns to the top spot for the Statesmen after posting a 10-7 record a year ago.

As always, the Statesmen will play a demanding schedule. Hobart opens up its season with weekend matches against Navy, Denison, and Franklin and Marshall. A week later, the Statesmen will enter the inaugural Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association (UCAA) Championship as the favorite to capture the league's first crown. The Statesmen will close out the regular season with a home match against the defending national champion Trinity Bantams.

Led by ninth-year Head Coach **CAROL WEYMULLER** (79-81, .494), the Statesmen have their sights set squarely on cracking the top-10.



ANDREW CHILDS

Sophomore, Buffalo, N.Y., The Nichols School

Childs was mentored by Hobart alum Bart Chambers '86 prior to joining the Statesmen in 2002. As a first-year, Childs spent the season improving his game. He's expected to compete for a spot in Hobart's top-nine this season.



HENRY CLUTSAM

Junior, Vernon, N.J., Blair Academy

A highly competitive player, Clutsam brings strength to the middle of Hobart's lineup. He made a mockery of the so-called sophomore jinx, producing an outstanding 13-4 mark last season. As a first-year, he posted a solid 11-9 record. A good team player, Clutsam knows how to win tight matches.



ANDREW CONRAD

First-year, Haverford, Pa., Millbrook School

Conrad is an accomplished scholastic player and a gifted athlete. He should compete for time in the top-nine right away.



FREDDY COOK

Junior, Greenwich, Conn., St. George's School

A tireless worker, Cook keeps pressure on his opponent and is perfectly happy playing a five-game match. Compiling an impressive 19-18 record through his first two seasons, he will be a mainstay in the middle of the Statesmen lineup again this season.



TUCKER CROCKETT

First-year, Rosemont, Pa., Episcopal Academy

A leader both on and off the court, Crockett comes to Hobart after helping Episcopal Academy to a second place finish in the Inter-Ac and a fourth place showing in the MASA Tournament. His scholastic success is expected to translate into a starting role for the Statesmen this season.



BENJAMIN CROSKY

First-year, Williamstown, Mass., Mountain Greylock

Another first-year in a very talented and deep class, Crosky joins the Statesmen after a successful season on the soccer pitch. He is expected to spend his first season in the Smith Center refining his game.



ROBERT DRAKE

Senior, Snyder, N.Y., The Nichols School

A knowledgeable player with plenty of junior experience, Drake is one of only two seniors on Hobart's roster. A consummate team player, he has worked diligently over the past three years for the betterment of the Statesmen.



GAVIN JOHNSTONE-BUTCHER

Sophomore, Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, St. Paul's School

A rangy and strong athlete, Johnstone-Butcher grew up playing softball squash in his native Zimbabwe and continued while attending St. Paul's School. The only first-year to crack Hobart's top-nine last season, he produced an impressive 11-6 record, playing primarily in the No. 2 spot. An accomplished two-sport athlete, he has tasted success both on the court and on the water with Hobart crew.



JOHN KEATING IV

First-year, Linwood, N.J., Mainland

Keating possesses solid racquet skills and good court vision. Due to Hobart's depth this season, he will spend the season developing his game in hopes of a starting role late in the campaign or next season.



MATTHEW LIBASSI

First-year, Sharon, Conn., Choate Rosemary Hall

Libassi is a newcomer to squash. He is a gifted runner and is quickly learning the game.



ANDREW McDONOUGH

First-year, Summit, N.J., Summit High School

McDonough joins the Statesmen with a stong juniors background. That experience and his all-around athleticism have him ready to compete for a spot in Hobart's top-nine this season.



PRATEEK PATNI

First-year, Indore, M.P., India, Daly College

Patni is the most talented athlete in the Class of 2007. The runner-up in the 2002 Indian Squash Under-17 Junior National Championships, he is an extremely fit athlete and plays points with the efficiency and skill of a veteran player. Patni will fill one of the top spots in Hobart's lineup this season.



TEJVIR RATHORE

Junior, Indore, M.P., India, Daly College

An exceptional all-around player, Rathore excels with drops, floating lobs, and running his opponent to the four corners. Clearly Hobart's top player, he heads into his third season boasting a 26-16 record and his sights set even higher.

Senior, Annapolis, Md., Woodberry Forest

One of only two seniors on the Hobart roster, Reutter is a strong leader and a solid contributor to the lower third of the Statesmen's lineup. Sporting a 15-14 record over the past two seasons, he's focused on making his final season for the purple and orange his best yet.

Squash Facilities



The Dr. Frank P. Smith '36 Squash Center was dedicated on October 3, 1998, during a ceremony at the HWS Sport and Recreation Center. The five international courts reflect the commitment of Hobart and William Smith to the future of the game. The courts are wider — 21 feet for international play, as opposed to 18.5 feet for the hardball game.



The Statesmen use the state-of-the-art strength training equipment available in the Sport and Recreation Center's exercise room.

About Hobart and William Smith Colleges

Hobart and William Smith Colleges are private, coordinate, liberal-arts colleges in Geneva, N.Y. Hobart College was founded in 1822, William Smith College in 1908. Hobart enrolls 831 men and William Smith 1,035 women. The full-time equivalent teaching faculty numbers 179.5 members, 98 percent of whom hold doctoral degrees.

The two colleges have the same faculty; classes are coeducational; and students use the same library and laboratories. Each college, however, awards its own degrees, has its own dean, and maintains its own student government and athletics programs.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

At the Colleges, the academic year is divided into two 15-week semesters. Students take four courses each semester, eight each year, for either a bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degree. The academic program traditionally comprises four years.

Majors are available in African/Africana studies; American studies; anthropology; architectural studies; arts and education; art history; Asian languages and cultures; biology; chemistry; classics; comparative literature; computer science; critical social studies; dance; economics; English; environmental studies; European studies; French; geoscience; Greek; history; international relations; Latin; Latin American studies; lesbian, gay and bisexual studies; mathematics; media and society; modern languages; music; philosophy; physics; political science; psychology; public policy studies; Russian area studies; sociology; Spanish; studio art; urban studies; women's studies; and writing and rhetoric.

Individual majors may be developed in consultation with an adviser. In addition, the Colleges offer a master of arts degree in education.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Hobart College Department of Athletics believes that intercollegiate athletics play a major role in the educational process, and strives to provide a challenging, meaningful, and exciting experience for student-athletes. The Hobart Statesmen, whose colors are royal purple and orange, field intercollegiate teams in 11 sports, including basketball, crew, cross country, golf, football, ice hockey, lacrosse, sailing, soccer, squash, and tennis.

Hobart is a member of the Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association (UCAA), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and Divisions III and I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).



The Administration PRESIDENT MARK D. GEARAN

Mark D. Gearan is a college president whose life exemplifies the strongest attributes of Hobart and William Smith Colleges: civic engagement, global awareness, a focus on the 21st century, and a commitment to students.

When named president in 1999, President Gearan was serving as director of the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C., a post he assumed in 1995. Prior to his Peace Corps directorship, he served at the White House as Assistant to the President and Director of Communications, as well as Deputy Chief of Staff.

A native of Gardner, Mass., President Gearan earned a bachelor's degree in government cum laude at Harvard University and a law degree from Georgetown University. He also is the recipient of 12 honorary degrees. President Gearan was confirmed by the U.S. Senate to serve on the board of the Corporation for National and Community Service, and was appointed to the national board of The Partnership of Public Service. He also serves on the board of the National Campus Compact and co-chairs the New York Campus Compact Executive Committee.



DEAN OF HOBART COLLEGE CLARENCE E. BUTLER

Clarence E. Butler became dean of Hobart College in July 1998. Butler came to Hobart in 1979, after serving on the faculties at Brown University and Dartmouth College. He first was named assistant dean, then senior associate dean in 1983, after serving for two years as acting dean of the College.

Butler has served on many committees, including the Committee on Standards, Individual Major Committee, and President's Advisory Council. Aside from his administrative duties, Butler has taught German part time and, as an Episcopal priest, has at times served the local

community in that capacity as well.

Butler received bachelor's and doctoral degrees from Washington University in St. Louis, a master's from the University of Kansas, and a bachelor of divinity degree from the Episcopal Theological School. He also received a language diploma from the University of Stockholm in Sweden. He is a former Fulbright Scholar and DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service) Scholar.



HOBART DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS MIKE HANNA '68

A 1968 graduate of Hobart, Mike Hanna became the College's athletics director in 1981. He has piloted the athletics program through unprecedented championships in lacrosse. His vision, along with that of his William Smith counterpart, led to the construction of the Robert A. Bristol '31 Field House in 1989 and the Dr. Frank P. Smith '36 Squash Center in 1998. Improvements in the new millennium under his tenure include the Bozzuto Boathouse, McCooey Field, Cozzens Field, the RFK Strength Training Center, the Topichak Team Rooms in the Elliott Varsity House, and the Tom Poole Team Room for Hobart Soccer.

As a quarterback, Hanna broke all of Hobart's season and career passing records during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. A second-team All-American lacrosse attackman in 1968, Hanna finished second for the Statesmen in scoring that year with 35 goals and 35 assists.
