## HEAD COACH CAROL WEYMULLER

Carol Weymuller enters her eighth season as the head coach of the Hobart squash program. Under her direction the Statesmen have been ranked in the top-20 nationally in each of the past seven seasons. Last season, she led the squash team to an 11-9 mark and a No. 15 national ranking. She has a career record of 69-74.

In 1994, Weymuller and her husband, Fred, received the U.S. Squash Racquets Association's President's Cup, the most prestigious award presented by the USSRA.

Also the leader of the Hobart tennis program, Weymuller led the Statesmen to a 16-4 record in 2001-02, the team's best record since 1994-95. Her career record currently stands at 60-74. The U.S. Professional Tennis Association recently honored Weymuller with its 2002 Tex Schwab Lifetime Achievement Award.

Weymuller earned a bachelor's degree in Spanish and elementary education from Bethany College in 1970. Upon graduation she worked as a tennis and squash professional at the Heights Casino in Brooklyn, N.Y., from 1970 through 1980, followed by a stint at the Genesee Valley Club in Rochester, N.Y., from 1980 through 1993. From 1993 through 1995, she was the squash professional at the University of Rochester Medical Center Athletic Club and the tennis professional at the Country Club of Rochester.

An accomplished player as well, Weymuller was the No. 1 ranked player in New York City from 1976 through 1978. She served as captain of the U.S. Team in 1981 and '83. She won a record 11 consecutive Rochester Women's Championships from 1981 through 1991.

Heading into its 36th year, the Hobart College squash team is coming off a strong 2001-02 season during which the Statesmen went 11-9 for their first winning campaign since 1993-94, and first ever in the soft ball, wide-court era. Victories over perennial squash powerhouses Colby and Amherst propelled Hobart to 15th in the national polls, four spots higher than the previous year.

Despite losing senior co-captains **ANDREW HUNT** and **REED HARWOOD** to graduation, eighth-year Head Coach **CAROL WEYMULLER** believes the younger players are prepared for the challenge of filling their shoes.

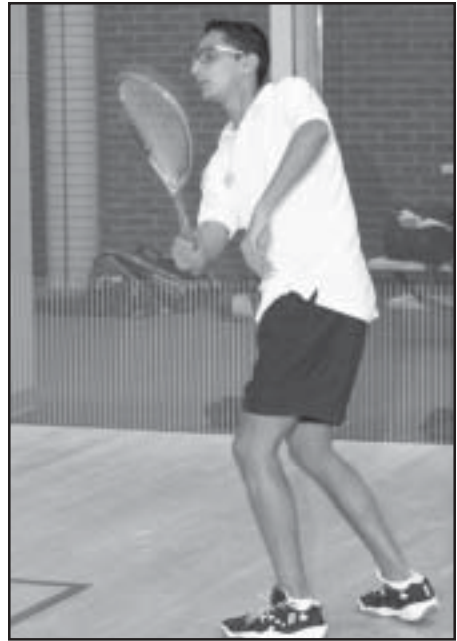
The 2002-03 Statesmen will feature five seniors with co-captains **ANGEL MAGAÑA-TORRES** and **RYAN GILLMORE** leading the way. Earning a spot on the El Salvadoran National Team this past summer in the Pan-American Federation Cup, Magaña-Torres will strengthen the top third of the lineup, while an experienced and fundamentally sound Gillmore anchors the middle third. **DAN ROY**, **JOHN CRAWFORD**, and **ALEC FLEMMING** will battle for the ninth and final starting position.

With demonstrated improvement in the off-season, **RICHARD REUTTER** leads the junior class as the only member in the starting nine. **JOHN HILDRETH** and **ROB DRAKE** will work on establishing a consistent game that can push them into the No. 9 spot.

Forming the backbone of the Statesmen lineup will be a talented crop of sophomores. Coming off a fine rookie season that saw him go 16-9, **TEJVIR RATHORE** headlines the team in the first position, while **ANDREW SCOTT** will be close behind playing second or third. **HENRY CLUTSAM** will round out the top five, with **CAMERON LISTER** and **FREDDY COOK** earning spots in the bottom third of the starting order. Improving on a daily basis **FIELDING McELROY** carries the potential to make his way into the starting lineup by the end of the season.

A strong first-year class will round out the squad with Zimbabwe native **GAVIN JOHNSTONE-BUTCHER** playing in the second spot. **DEVIN RESLER** is a strong challenger for the ninth place, while **ANDREW CHILDS**, **JARED SHAHID**, and **MICHAEL TIEN** are vying for higher spots on the team ladder.

Hobart opens its fifth season in the Dr. Frank P. Smith Squash Center on Nov. 17, against perennial power Franklin & Marshall. The Diplomats will be only one of the Statesmen's tough opponents in 2002-03. Hobart will face top programs such as Navy, Williams, Yale, Amherst, Denison, Bates, Colby, Bowdoin and 2002 national champion Trinity College. The results from these matches will determine the team's seeding at nationals in Princeton, N.J.

## ANDREW CHILDS

First-year, Buffalo, N.Y., The Nichols School

Childs was mentored by Hobart alum Bart Chambers '86 prior to joining the Statesmen in 2002. As a first-year he will spend much of his time improving his game to earn a spot in the starting lineup.



## HENRY CLUTSAM

Sophomore, Vernon, N.J., Blair Academy

A highly competitive player, Clutsam has solidified a spot among the top five in the lineup after a strong rookie season during which he went 11-9. A good team player, Clutsam knows how to win matches.



## FREDDY COOK

Sophomore, Greenwich, Conn., St. George's School

A tireless worker, Cook keeps pressure on his opponent and is perfectly happy playing a five-game match. Compiling an impressive 12-8 record in his first year, he will be a mainstay in the middle of the Statesmen lineup this season.



## JOHN CRAWFORD

Senior, Wayland, Mass., Wayland High School

Returning from studying abroad during the 2001-02 season, Crawford will have to battle for a place in the starting nine.



## ROBERT DRAKE

Junior, Snyder, N.Y., The Nichols School

A knowledgeable player with plenty of junior experience, Drake broke into the starting lineup a few times, but is still looking for the consistency in his game that can keep him there.



## ALEC FLEMMING

Senior, Williamsville, N.Y., Canisius School

A competitive player, Flemming saw action in three matches for Hobart in 2001-02, but has yet to find the formula to stay on top.



## RYAN GILLMORE

Senior, Pepper Pike, Ohio, Hawken School

A solid two-sport athlete in squash and tennis, Gillmore possesses good fundamentals and plenty of racquet sport experience, allowing him to take care of all but the toughest opponents in the middle positions of the lineup. He is also the captain of the tennis team and solid No. 3 performer on the tennis court.



## JOHN HILDRETH

Junior, Marblehead, Mass., St. Mark's School

A gifted racquet wielder who is developing consistency on the court, Hildreth is showing signs that his strong work ethic will pay dividends as the season progresses.



## GAVIN JOHNSTONE-BUTCHER

First-year, Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, St. Paul's School

A rangy and strong athlete, Johnstone-Butcher grew up playing soft ball squash in his native Zimbabwe and continued while attending St. Paul's School. Boasting a powerful deep game, backed up by good boasts and drops, his fall season as an oarsman for the Hobart crew team gave him a head start on squash conditioning which will make a big difference down the final stretch.



## CAMERON LISTER

Sophomore, Pittsburgh, Pa., Shady Side Academy

The talented musician turned in a fine first year on the squash court, winning nine matches against seven loses. He's expected to hold down the No. 6 position and provide the Statesmen with quality wins against even the toughest of opponents.



## ANGEL MAGAÑA-TORRES

Senior, San Salvador, El Salvador, Colegio San Francisco

Holding on to the No. 4 spot and team co-captaincy is senior Magaña-Torres. A member of the El Salvadoran National Team this past summer in the Pan-American Federation Cup, he possesses a strong all-around game with especially good power, speed, accurate rails and cross-court shots.



## FIELDING McELROY

Sophomore, Hinsdale, Ill., Avon Old Farms

McElroy comes to Hobart with experience at Avon Old Farms. He shows good potential and could break into the starting nine before the season ends.



## TEJVIR RATHORE

Sophomore, IndoreM.P., India, Daly College

A team leader, Rathore heads into his sophomore season injury free with a resolve to exceed his fine rookie season record of 16-9. Though an exceptional all-around player, he excels with drops, floating lobs, using his volley to gain an advantage, and running his opponent to the four corners.



## DEVIN RESLER

First-year, Stormville, N.Y., Millbrook School

A talented player, Resler is adapting to the collegiate game and is poised to take over the No. 9 spot on the team.



## RICHARD REUTTER

Junior, Annapolis, Md., Woodberry Forest

Sporting a 6-6 record last year at No. 9, Reutter's off-season improvement will land him the No. 8 spot in 2002-03. A tall and strong player, he garnered important victories in 2001-02 over tough opponents from Navy and Amherst.

The Dr. Frank P. Smith '36 Squash Center was dedicated on October 3, 1998, during a ceremony at the Robert A. Bristol Sport and Recreation Center. The five international courts reflect the commitment of Hobart and William Smith to the future of the game.

The new courts are wider — 21 feet for international play as opposed to 18.5 feet for the hardball game. The international game uses a softer ball which, according to Smith, makes the points longer and puts a premium on fitness, rather than on shot making. The Colleges switched to the international, or English style of squash because the National Intercollegiate Squash Racquets Association (NISRA) has made that the standard for intercollegiate play.

Hobart and William Smith Colleges are coordinate, private, liberal arts institutions, located in Geneva, N.Y., the heart of the Finger Lakes Region. The Colleges, which have a combined enrollment of 1,885, offer a remarkably broad array of majors and minors, with a cross-disciplinary flavor intended to better inform both professional and intellectual pursuits. The Colleges are noted also for an ambitious emphasis on international study, and for their programs in community service. Hobart College for men and William Smith College for women share faculty, facilities, and curriculum, but maintain separate dean's offices, athletics programs, student governments, and traditions.

## ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

At the Colleges, the academic year is divided into two 15-week semesters. Students take four courses each term, eight per year, for either a bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degree. The academic program traditionally comprises four years.

Majors are available in African/Africana studies, American studies, anthropology, architectural studies, arts and education, art history, Asian languages and cultures, biology, chemistry, classics, comparative literature, computer science, critical social studies, dance, economics, English, environmental studies, European studies, French, geoscience, Greek, history, international relations, Latin, Latin American studies, lesbian, gay, and bisexual studies, mathematics, media and society, modern languages, music, philosophy, physics, political science, psychology, public policy studies, religious studies, Russian area studies, sociology, Spanish, studio art, urban studies, women's studies, and writing and rhetoric.

## MISSION STATEMENT

## ATHLETICS PROGRAM

The Hobart Statesmen, whose colors are royal purple and orange, field intercollegiate teams in 11 sports, including basketball, crew, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, ice hockey, sailing, soccer, squash, and tennis.

Hobart is a member of the Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association (UCAA), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and Divisions III and I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).



## PRESIDENT MARK D. GEARAN

Mark D. Gearan, bringing extensive experience in public service and a strong commitment to undergraduate liberal arts education and international studies, became Hobart College's 26th president and William Smith College's 15th president in August 1999.

When named to that position by the Colleges' trustees, Gearan was serving as director of the U.S. Peace Corps in Washington, D.C., a position he assumed in 1995. His extensive credentials in public policy and service include having served at the White House as Assistant to the President, Director of Communications, and Deputy Chief of Staff.

## DEAN OF HOBART COLLEGE CLARENCE E. BUTLER

Clarence E. Butler became dean of Hobart College in July, 1998. Butler came to Hobart in 1979, after serving on the faculties at Brown University and Dartmouth College. He served as assistant dean, then was named senior associate dean in 1983 after serving for two years as acting dean of the College.

Butler has served on many committees, including the Committee on Standards, Individual Major Committee, and President's Advisory Council. Aside from his administrative duties, Butler has taught classes in German and, as an Episcopal priest, has at times served the local community in that capacity as well.

Butler received bachelor's and doctoral degrees from Washington University in St. Louis, a master's from the University of Kansas, and the B.D. from the Episcopal Theological School. He also received a language diploma from the University of Stockholm in Sweden. He is a former Fulbright Scholar and DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service) Scholar.



## HOBART DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS MICHAEL J. HANNA '68

A 1968 graduate of Hobart, Michael J. Hanna became the College's athletics director in 1981. He has piloted the athletics program through unprecedented championships in lacrosse, and his vision, along with that of his William Smith counterpart, has led to the construction of the Robert A. Bristol '31 Field House in 1989 and the Dr. Frank P. Smith '36 Squash Center in 1998. Improvements in the new millennium include an AstroTurf stadium, Cozzens Memorial Field, and the Topichak Team Rooms in the Elliott Varsity House.

As a quarterback, Hanna broke all of Hobart's season and career passing records during the 1966 and 1967 seasons. A second-team All-American lacrosse attackman in 1968, Hanna finished second for the Statesmen in scoring that year with 35 goals and 35 assists. He co-captained both the football and lacrosse teams his senior year. During his senior year he was awarded the Francis L. "Babe" Kraus Award as Hobart's Athlete of the Year and was also presented the Judge Kane Award as MVP in lacrosse.
